	Invention and Entrepeneurship in Global History	W. Bernard Carlson Professor and Chair Department of Engineering & Society	This course will provide a panoramic view of how people have used technology to shape culture, and will help students to understand better the ways in which individuals shape technology in response to economic and cultural imperatives. Using comparative approach, this course will reveal the human and cultural origins of the material world by examining a variety of different cultures, particularly how Chinese and Western societies often took the same invention and deployed it in remarkably different ways, e.g. crossbows, gunpowder, printing, the magnetic compass, and religious structures (pagodas and cathedrals).
